
Past due notices (red cards) will be mailed on January 27, 2010 for any account that has an overdue balance, this is the FINAL REMINDER prior to having the water service shut off.

Drug Free Caroline Coalition Reflects on 2009 Successes

As you look to 2010 and make your New Year's resolutions you may be thinking about finding ways to help you and your family become healthier and more productive. Interestingly enough one local organization, Drug Free Caroline Coalition, is thinking about exactly the same thing.

The Drug Free Caroline Coalition is a collaboration among youth, families, businesses, law enforcement, school officials, and other community representatives. The coalition seeks to encourage community participation in substance abuse reduction and prevention programs with the ultimate goal of strengthening families and communities.

"We all know that substance abuse is taking a tremendous toll on the American family and society as a whole," says Karen Bishop, Drug Free Caroline Coalition Coordinator. "The rate of impact on our youth is staggering and Caroline County has not been spared this reality. Data gathered over the last several years has indicated that the

rate of substance use, particularly alcohol, among our youth is higher than the Maryland State average. More frightening than that is the fact that the age of first use is getting younger," she adds.

Many people may minimize the problem of substance abuse in Caroline County by saying it is simply 'kids being kids' and it is just a 'rite of passage', however, the statistics say much more. According to the most recent report, Caroline County had the highest rate of alcohol-related school suspensions per population, in Maryland in the 2006-07 school year. In addition, the rate of drug-induced deaths in Caroline County in 2006 was higher than the State rate.

"We are not seeking to tell parents how to raise their children, but to empower them to be the best, most informed parents they can be. Parents need to know that, as much as it seems they don't, their kids really do listen to them when they give them clear guidance about what they should or should not do," says Continue to page 5



Denton Police Department . . . Winter Season Property Damage

With colder weather come unique concerns for potential property damage.

Winterweathercancausemajor property losses from not only storm activity, but also the impairment of normal public services and other necessary operations. Drifting snow can adversely affect the structural integrity of buildings if permitted to accumulate. Ice storms are also common to the entire state of Maryland. Collapse of structures is the most common problem with accumulation of ice and snow load: frozen and burst plumbing and the resulting water damage account for the greatest number of claims when severe cold temperatures occur.

Pre-Event Actions:

Buildings should not only be designed to withstand normally anticipated snow/ice loads, but also loads that could very well exceed general historical levels. This would also apply to building modifications such as additions or add-ons, which may create parapet walls or roof elevation changes where snow/ice loads and the action of drifting snow were not considered in the design.

Emergency power equipment should be available to provide backup utility services, operate pumps, and maintain fire protection systems; U.L. approved portable heating devices can be used to keep water lines from freezing and to maintain space heating needs in critical areas.

Building Insulation should be adequate for the cold weather. Heating systems should be properly designed and of adequate size and serviced annually to make sure of their reliability in the event of extremely cold weather. If the structure is one that is used seasonally and is not used during the winter months make sure that it is properly winterized, plumbing drained. and other systems decommissioned for the cold weather.

Materials such as posts, lumber, plywood, plastic sheets, and tarpaulins should be available to make temporary structural bracing and emergency repairs. Tree branches that overhang power lines should be trimmed and removed.

Personnel should be trained and assigned to handle emergency operations including the placement of temporary structural supports, removing snow/ice accumulations, and operating emergency equipment.

Post-Event Actions:

Salvage and clean-up operations should be started and building protection should be restored to full and proper operation.

Damaged areas should be isolated and temporary repairs completed. Cover any building opening caused by the storm event to minimize further damage from weather. Emergency repairs should be implemented as soon as possible.

If Cold Weather Property Damage Does Occur:

• Buildings should be inspected to insure their structural soundness.

• Heating systems should be serviced and operating properly.

• Seasonal structures should be properly winterized.

• Emergency equipment should be ready to provide backup utility services.

• Over hanging tree limbs should be removed.

• Personnel should be trained and assigned in case of a winter emergency.

• Emergency repairs should be implemented as soon as possible.

• Cover any opening caused by storm damage.

• Use temporary heat as needed to avoid additional freezing damage.

• Report the event as soon as possible to LGIT.

• Make note of important information for your insurer.

Talking to Your Teen About Drugs

Have you talked to your teen about staying away from drugs? Here are some tips to help you begin your conversation.

Research shows that better skills can decrease conflict, increase influence, and produce more successful conversations with your teen around important issues like drug and alcohol use.

Here are some specific skills parents can implement when tackling the topic of drug use with their teens:

KEEP YOUR BEST MOTIVES IN MIND.

When we feel upset, we become angry or fearful, and as a result our motives change. Without realizing it, we begin to focus on punishing, being right, or keeping the peace rather than healthy problem solving. Before talking to your teenager about drugs, pause for a moment and ask the focusing question: What do I really want? This pause can help you get your motives in check and move from simply "keeping the peace" through silence to being a powerful influence on your teen. **CONFRONT WITH FACTS,** NOT JUDGEMENTS.

When you present the facts, you obligate your teen to respond to the information. When you use judgments or accusatory language, it appears you intend simply to humiliate or punish, and your teen feels no obligation to engage in the conversation. Replace, "You're a liar, and I won't stand for this," with "Over the past week I've noticed alcohol missing from the garage refrigerator. Your dad and I haven't moved it or drunk it. I just looked there a few days ago, so it must have disappeared recently. As far as I know you are the only one who has been at home." MAKE IT SAFE

during your crucial conversations less because of what you're saying than because of why they think you're saying it. Here are three steps to help them feel safe in the conversation:

• State what you don't intend and what you do intend: "I want to reassure you that I have no desire to make your decisions for you, or to cut you off from having a happy life. I want to be supportive of you, and I want to influence choices you might make that I believe will hurt you."

• Be flexible about when you talk, but not about whether you talk. Control is a huge issue for teens. Sometimes parents provoke an unnecessary confrontation by demanding that conversations be on their terms and their timeframe. It's best to try to engage your child in dialogue by respecting their preferences about when to talk. "I'd like to talk openly with you about your concerns and mine. I'm interested in hearing your views even if we disagree. Is now a good time to do that or would it be better later? And if later, when would be good for you?"

Respecting your teen's timetable for talking does not mean you are no longer the parent. If they don't want to talk now, show respect by being flexible-within reason. If your teen just doesn't want to talk at all-help him or her understand why talking is required. "I understand that you don't want to talk right now. I also know that you intend to go to a party tonight where I have reason to believe there might be bad influences. If we can't talk before then, I'll need to decide how to deal with the party tonight on my own. If we can talk before then, it will give me a chance to hear your point of view. What would you

prefer we do?"

• Create a "safety reserve" by creating safety even when there are no problems. Communicating respect, praising small positive signs, "catching" them when they're being good, and showing an interest in your teen's life will help him or her feel much safer talking to you when problems emerge.

DISCUSS, AGREE ON, AND STICK WITH BOUNDARIES.

If you talk about rules around curfews, choice of friends, and your expectations of knowing where your teen is before he or she is tempted to make bad choices, it is much easier to enforce them later. Then when boundaries are violated, hold your teen accountable consistently. If it's a boundary, it should always be a boundary.

EVALUATE THE DIALOGUE.

You're aiming for a two-way,

Bishop. "Our youth are our future and our most valuable resource. We seek to partner with parents and other stakeholders like the kids themselves, schools, communities of faith and businesses so that we put our kids in the best position possible to succeed and be happy, productive, healthy adults," she adds.

Among the coalition's accomplishments over the past year are.

• Conducting 43 compliance

checks of businesses selling/serving alcohol, and citing four businesses providing for alcohol to minors.

• Receiving 15 calls on the confidential TIPS LINE, one of which resulted in an adult being charged for providing alcohol to under aged youth.

· Advocacy work on a possible county 'social hosting' ordinance, including conducting a survey to measure community perception of this issue and need for such an ordinance. Of the 149 people surveyed 85 percent thought that social hosting was a problem and 79.5 percent said they would support a social hosting ordinance.



Whether you live on or near Maryland's waterways or simply enjoy fishing, swimming, or kayaking, what you do in your backyard can be important.

Marvland's waterways are a network of connected streams, wetlands, creeks and rivers. They are affected by everything that takes place on the land around them. Your backyard may be miles away from the closest river, but runoff from your house, driveway, and vard drains into a ditch, that leads to a stream, that empties into one of Maryland's rivers or bays.

Improving Maryland's waterways by reducing pollution and increasing habitat starts at home-in your own backyard. If your backyard is pretty basic, mostly grass with a few trees or shrubs, it could use a makeover! It's easy and fun to improve your backyard. The benefits include less maintenance. more wildlife, a more attractive landscape, and cleaner water!

Giving your backyard a "Bay Smart" makeover can start with eliminating areas of lawn and planting trees and shrubs instead. It is best to use plants that grow naturally in Maryland. These plants attract wildlife, survive well, and add beauty to your yard. Less lawn

means less lawn mowing and more time to relax on your deck or patio. Decks and patios can be "Bay Smart" too! Using pervious pavers and spaced decking reduces water pollution and maintains natural drainage.

Your backyard makeover can include other ideas that promote waterways. Collecting healthy runoff in rain barrels provides water for landscaping. Installing a "rain garden" helps runoff seep slowly into the soil rather than running off into a ditch or gutter that leads to a stream. The following pages include a variety of ideas that can be part of your "Bay Smart" makeover.

Rain Gardens

Rain gardens are shallow depressions planted with a variety of plants that soak up rainwater and runoff from houses, roads, and walkways. The plants and soil in rain gardens keep polluted runoff from draining into waterways and let it seep slowly into the soil.

• Provide storage and treatment of stormwater runoff keeping it out of waterways

• Include trees, shrubs, and plants that take up nutrients

· Designed to infiltrate water within 24 hours

• Provide habitat for birds,

butterflies, and amphibians. Rain Barrels

Rain barrels are large containers placed under downspouts to collect runoff when it rains. Rain barrels can be both beautiful and functional. You can buy them at your local garden shop or building store. A hose connection on the rain barrel makes it easy to use the stored water.

• Available in many designs and styles

• Keep stormwater runoff on site and out of waterways

• Store water that can be used for watering trees, shrubs, and landscape plants

• Designed with overflow valves for heavy rains.

Pervious Materials

Building materials like porous pavers and spaced wood decking are great for outdoor spaces. They allow rain to pass through them and soak into the soil. This means less water running off the land, which can cause erosion and carry pollutants to creeks and rivers.

• Pavers sold in a variety of shapes, sizes, colors, and designs





It's Snow Plowing Season

event can be difficult. The variations in the rate of snowfall, moisture content, air/surface temperatures,

time of day, and wind velocity make each storm unique. Public Works crews need cooperation your to effectively clear our streets after a snowstorm. If at all

possible, residents should wait until the storm has passed and roads are passable to venture out.

To achieve the best possible results in the most efficient manner from the Department, residents are asked to remove their parked vehicles, trailers, and boats from all Town streets if possible. This will allow snow plows an opportunity to clear the streets with fewer passes, improve accessibility, and minimize damage to private vehicles, thereby saving both time and money.

Streets in Denton are prioritized into four categories for snow and ice events. Priority One streets are designated snow emergency routes that must be kept open at all times. Snow plowing begins when the accumulation of snow in the streets exceeds approximately two inches and snow continues to fall The street accumulation is generally independent of the total accumulation of snow in the area. All Priority One streets are plowed before proceeding to any other areas.

Plowing of Priority Two streets will begin when accumulations of snow on the streets exceed approximately two inches and after all Priority One streets have been plowed. Plowing operations will begin on Priority Three streets and public parking lots after the completion of plowing operations on snow emergency routes. Sand is normally applied to hilly areas/ intersections as needed.

Winter Tips:

If driving cannot be avoided



Planning for a winter storm when a snow emergency is declared, allow extra time to get to your destination. When roadways are

> icy or snow covered, you should never expect to drive as you would during clear weather or on dry road surfaces. following Increase distance between your vehicle and others on the road. Remember

> that bridges and ramps freeze first and may be especially difficult to navigate.

Do not abandon your vehicle. If your car breaks down, move your vehicle as far off the road as possible and lift the hood. Try to leave a distress signal, such as a scarf, hanging from the window.

To assure good visibility, try to remove all ice and snow from the windows, wipers, mirrors, and lights of your car. Remove snow and ice from the front grill, hood, and roof of your vehicle to reduce the chance of snow flying off of your vehicle while driving.

When shoveling snow from your driveway, shovel to the right when facing the street. You do not want to shovel the snow onto an area that will simply be plowed back onto the driveway after the plows come through. The shoveled snow should not be stacked over the ends of culverts or catch basins. Thawing snow could overload the drainage facilities and cause local flooding.

There are limited memberships at each distribution site. To hold a membership we will accept a deposit of \$100. This is non-refundable. The total membership fee is due before March 1, 2010. If full payment is received by December 15, 2009 you will receive your Blades Orchard reusable shopping bag just in time for Christmas. CSA makes a great Christmas gift, too!

Distribution Sites:

St. Michaels on Saturday, Easton on Saturday, Denton on Tuesday, Cambridge on Thursday, Federalsburg (at the orchard) on Wednesday.

Members receive fresh vegetables and fruit weekly. Each distribution site will be open for 2 hours, between 4p.m. and 6 p.m. on the above mentioned weekdays and 9a.m. to 11a.m. on Saturdays in St. Michaels and Easton .

At the end of each distribution, all shares remaining will immediately be donated to a local food bank. The share will vary depending on the harvest available on any given day. The CSA is a joint venture between you and the farmer. The risk is shared among us all.

My goal is to make every year a great year. We work tirelessly to insure a crop that you will enjoy feeding your family and one that is abundant with fresh vegetables and fruit.

You will receive recipes for the various items in your bag and a list of each item and quantity receive.

We strongly encourage volunteering, but is not required by our CSA. At the distribution sites we will ask members to "sign-up" to man the distribution site once during the season.

Each day of distribution we will harvest in the morning and welcome all helping hands at the Orchard.

What about that "Fruit Only Share"? This year we are offering this share in partnership with Seaberry Farm of Caroline County, First Fruits Orchard of Caroline County, and Boyle Bee Farm. Between the four of us we offer:

Peaches, apples, blueberries, blackberries, grapes, watermelon, cantaloupe, gourmet melons, honey, and preserves made from these fruits.



Attention Settlement Attorneys

Reminder to all settlement attorneys and agencies to please contact the Denton Town Office for fees due to the Town when handling settlements for properties being sold or transferred within the Town limits. There may be water/sewer fees or miscellaneous charges that need to be collected at the time of settlement. This will keep the Town's records up to date and better serve the residents of the Town of Denton. This will also eliminate problems after settlement of any outstanding balances for the new property owner.

Please note: Any property that transfers ownership and the utility fees are not collected at settlement and forwarded to the town that result in the water being turned off for non-payment, the water turn on fee will still be charged. This charged may be passed on to the settlement attorney. Currently the fee to turn water service back on during regular business hours is \$50.00 and after 3:30 p.m., the fee is \$100.00. Introduced 10/5/09, Adopted 11/2/09, became effective 12/17/09.


