2009 Planning Commission Report

The Town of Denton with a population of approximately 4,000 residents is home to the county seat of Caroline County, Maryland. Denton has an elected board of five Council members, an appointed board of six Planning Commission members (five regular and one alternate), four Board of Appeals members (three regular and one alternate), and five members on the Historic and Architectural Review Commission.

This Annual Report is compiled by the Planning Commission to provide data on current building trends as well as a historical perspective. A combination of charts and graphs are included to aid in understanding the development and building activity within the municipal limits. References to projects that have been reviewed and approved by the Planning Commission are also included.

The Town hired a full-time planner in 2008 to manage the newly created office of Planning and Codes, which succeeded the office of Housing and Community Development wherein the planning and code enforcement activities previously took place.

The Town of Denton adopted the International Building Code 2006, International Residential Code 2006, International Mechanical Code 2006, and the International Property Maintenance Code 2006 editions in 2008 and will be adopting the 2009 editions in 2010 as mandated by the State.

The Department of Planning and Codes issues all permits for properties within the Town of Denton's incorporated limits. Denton has one full time and one part-time

building code inspector who review plans, approve permits, and conduct on-site inspections. Additionally, the Town has a part time property maintenance inspector to evaluate existing structures and parcels, and to investigate complaints of alleged violations.

The Town Council, at the behest of the planning staff and recommended by the Planning Commission, created one alternate position on the Planning Commission. The vacancy was filled by an individual who was very active in community affairs.

The planning staff took over the responsibility of water and sewer allocations. It revisited the water and sewer allocation process to insure adherence to the codes and policies. It was determined that certain allocations had lapsed. The process will be communicated to all applicants to ensure their understanding of the requirements for necessary approvals.

Denton undertook its first ever Critical Area growth allocation associated with the Denton Planning Commission approval of a 41-lot subdivision in 2008. The Critical Area Commission approved the growth allocation in 2009, which changed the designation for nearly 10-acres from Limited Developed Area (LDA) to Intensely Developed Area (IDA). The subdivision approval and growth allocation were consistent with the currently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

Planning Staff created a new Official Zoning Map to replace the one approved in May 1999 (Map 1). The Town Council adopted the revised Official Zoning Map (Map

Town Council to Consider Rate Increases for Water and Sewer

In 2009 the Denton Utility Commission undertook an extensive study of the water and sewer rate structure of the Town. Included in the study were administrative and operational costs as well as comparisons to comparable communities in the area. The result was a recommendation by the Utility Commission to the Town Council for rate increases that took effect July 1, 2009.

Why is another rate increase necessary? A significant factor supporting the decision to increase rates in FY10 was the long-term outlook for the fund balances. Prior to the increase, the combined water and sewer operation were projected to be out of balance sometime during fiscal year 2012, but restoring the financial health also required subsequent rate increases in FY11, FY12, and FY13.

The FY09 Audited Financial Statement reflected the assets and liabilities for the Water and Sewer Funds in which the Water Fund had no cash and about half of the unrestricted net assets of the Sewer Fund were made up of debt from the Water Fund.

The Utility Commission went back to the study, updated the year end figures and recently advised the Council that a sufficient water and sewer rate increase was necessary to cover the cost to continue providing these services. The Water and Sewer Funds are required by law to be self sufficient.

Rate increases are never popular, but several reasons impacted the decision:

· higher operational costs

allowing the continuance of providing clean, safe water;

- higher electric and fuel costs;
- increased cost of chemicals used to treat the water to keep it safe;
- maintaining aging infrastructure including pipes, pumps, and treatment systems;
- along with the revenue shortfall from fewer new connections.

The table on page 2 shows the rate structure that would be required to support the capital projects and begin to rebuild cash reserves in the out-years. Essentially the Town is working towards a \$200 per year administrative fee to provide water and sewer capacity to Town customers. That fee will produce 27% of the \$1,200,000 real fixed costs of operating water and sewer facilities, and puts both the water and sewer operations back on a sustainable financial projection.

Water Bills Mailed July 1

Utility Bills will be mailed around July 1, 2010 and are due to be paid by July 25, 2010. Interest at the rate of 1% is added on July 25, 2010.

Past due notices (red cards) will be mailed on July 27, 2010 for any account that has an overdue balance; this is the FINAL REMINDER prior to having the water service shut off.

Payments can be made during regular office hours, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. or after hours by placing the payment in an envelope in the night deposit box located to the right of the front door on the outside of the Town Office building.

Water that is turned off for non-payment will be assessed a service charge in order to have the water turned back on. The water turn-on service charge is \$50.00 if turned back on before 3:30 p.m. and \$100.00 for after hours, this fee is subject to change.

It is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that payments are made in a timely manner.

Landlords and property managers who have arrangements for the tenants to pay the bills, please be sure to forward the bills to the tenants immediately upon receiving them to ensure prompt payment and to avoid shut off issues. In the past several tenants have stated that they do not receive the bill until the day it is due or when late notices have been sent.

Failure to receive the bill does not relieve the responsibility of the payment that is due. If a citizen is unable to make their payment by the due date, please contact the Finance Department at 410-479-2050 prior to July 25, 2010.

Water service will be shut off for non-payment.



Thunder Storms and Lightning

Thunderstorms often come up suddenly and can present a variety of hazards, including power outages caused by lightning, heavy rains, hail, and wind. Such storms usually affect Maryland in the late spring, summer, or early fall, but can happen any time cold and warm air masses collide. Thunderstorms are

sometimes even associated with snow showers. About 2,000 thunderstorms are in progress around the world at any given moment with lightning striking about 100 times every second. And yes, lighting can, and does, strike twice! Each

year lightning kills 80-100 people and injures hundreds more.

Thunderstorms and lightning are very common for Maryland. Here's what you can do to protect

- Before a storm be aware of weather forecasts at all times.
- Watch for signs of approaching storms.
- Keep a battery operated radio handy.
- Postpone outdoor activities if thunderstorms are likely
 - Remember, if you can hear

thunder, you are close enough to the storm to get struck by lightning. Get to shelter immediately.

- Get out of boats and away from water.
- Unplug appliances, avoid using the telephone.
 - Do not bathe or shower.
- Get to higher ground if flash flooding is likely to occur from the storm.
 - If out doors and shelter is not nearby, find a low spot away from trees, fences and poles.

If you feel your skin tingle or your hair stand on end, you are about to be

struck by lighting! Squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet. Place your hands on your knees with your head between them. Make yourself the smallest target possible, and minimize your contact with the ground.

2) in April 2009 which corrected errors and included all annexations since 1999. The official map adoption was consistent with the currently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

During the 2009 calendar year, 123 permits were issued, of which 2 were for new residential units. This represents a 30% decrease in total permits from 2008. Total dollar amount for all construction, including renovations and new for this period, was \$3,794,808. This 2009 year's construction of approximately \$3.8 million decreased 62% from the prior 2008 year's total of approximately \$10 million. All approvals were consistent with the currently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

In 2009, at the behest of the Planning Commission, the Town Council adopted two ordinances that changed the Table of Density and Dimensional Regulations. These changes were consistent with the currently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

The following projects are ongoing:

- Denton Development Corporation development of Crouse Park waterfront visitor's center and restaurant approval stage
- Savannah Overlook (Cattail Commons) 161 unit residential subdivision completely built; approved phase IV of two lots is not yet under construction
- Mallard Landing 187 unit residential subdivision 98 percent built
- Trice 49 Lot Residential Subdivision 36 percent built
- Sandy Meadows 58 Dwelling Unit Residential Subdivision 79 percent built
- Parkview Estates 26 unit residential subdivision 27 percent built
- Gannon's Purchase / Village at Watts Creek 257 unit Planned Neighborhood (PN) preliminary site plan with approved Development Rights and Responsibilities Agreement – not yet under construction
- The Gardens 62 unit residential subdivision (final plat recorded in 2006) not yet under construction
- Fearins Crossing I 60 lot residential subdivision not yet under construction
- Fearins Crossing II 12 lot residential subdivision final plat recorded in 2009 not yet under construction
- Glenfield 41 lot residential subdivision final approval with growth allocation (Map 3)
- Gay Street Redevelopment 24 residential unit subdivision preliminary subdivision approval
- West Denton 3,000 Dwelling Unit Planned Neighborhood (PN)

To address the demand for new dwelling units, and to protect the integrity of architecture common to the area, the Town hired a firm to design a pattern book. Through a series of public meetings with residents and community stakeholders, the desire to eliminate architectural monotony in new residential communities was solidified. The Denton Town Council reviewed and approved the final draft of the Pattern Book. Although they considered a formal adoption of an ordinance which would provide for the application of the Pattern Book to all residential subdivisions, site plans, and individual residential lots; the Council approved the book as a resource guide for individual property owners. However, the Denton Planning Commission shall utilize the Pattern Book for all Planned Neighborhood development projects. In 2009, an ordinance was approved that applied the

Pattern Book to Townhouses, duplexes, and apartments as well.

An additional tool available to the Planning Commission is the Planned Neighborhood District (PN). The PN offers an opportunity for a planned mixed use neighborhood through a floating zone. All newly annexed parcels of land in excess of 50 acres are required to develop as a PN as part of their annexation agreement. The PN offers increased density opportunities in exchange for a variety of housing types, central neighborhood areas, cohesiveness with adjoining properties, extension, implementation of pedestrian walkways, and design criteria that mimic the architecture of the Eastern Shore.

The Planning Commission remains vigilant in its role to direct growth and development appropriately and offers the following recommendations for consideration by the Town Council:

- Adopt the Draft 2010 Comprehensive Plan, including the new State required growth and water resources elements, by May 25, 2010.
- Adopt a Comprehensive Rezoning Ordinance, for Land Use and Zoning which is consistent with the adopted Comprehensive Plan, by June 30, 2010.
- Incorporate into the Comprehensive Plan robust transportation, economic redevelopment, and recreation components.
- Revise zoning and land use codes as appropriate throughout the 2010 year based upon Planning Commission and planning staff recommendations.
- Adopt Stormwater Management Ordinance by May 4, 2010, in accordance with MDE requirements (completed, however to be amended to address HB 1125 emergency regulations).
- Continue any and all activities, plans, processes, and/or procedures that encourage infill and redevelopment opportunities.
- Insure that quality of life considerations for health, safety, and welfare of Town residents are appropriately addressed.
- Support the enforcement of the sidewalk policy ordinance and require sidewalks or a pedestrian / bicycle trail on at least one side of every street.
- Continue requesting SHA approval for access onto MD Route 404 at Gay Street intersection, which allows access via Commerce Drive, from Legion Road.

During the last half of the recent decade, the Town of Denton has received a significant increase in residential development with little corresponding commercial growth. While a number of commercial development projects are in the planning stages, the Planning Commission remains concerned about this trend and recommends that the Council implement policies that will encourage balanced growth going forward. The ultimate goal should be to foster local job growth to complement and support our growing population. The Draft 2010 Comprehensive Plan increases land area for commercial, reduces land area for residential, and addresses economic development opportunities for Denton overall and in the downtown, which is experiencing a high vacancy rate.

The Planning Commission has focused on the need for connectivity within the Town between government offices, parks, and residential areas. As a result, a sidewalk / bicycle policy was developed into an ordinance that requires all government owned properties within the Town limits to construct public sidewalks at all abutting streets within two years. If the sidewalks are not constructed by the property owner, the Ordinance directs

Outdoor Water Conservation

Is your water bill too high in the



warmer months? Residential irrigation can account for 40% of domestic water consumption in a municipality. This

can become a problem especially during the summer months when the majority of outdoor water use occurs. It can also be the time when there is likely to be a water shortage.

Tips to follow to conserve:

- Don't over-water your lawn.
 Most lawns need only an inch of water a week.
- Watering lawns in the early morning hours when the temperature and wind speed are the lowest reduces losses from evaporation.
- Position your sprinklers so that your water lands on the lawn and shrubs and not on the street, driveway, or sidewalk.
- Do not leave sprinklers unattended. Regularly check the systems to make sure they are operating properly. Turn them off when storms are approaching.
- Raising your mower blade to at least three inches encourages grass roots to grow deeper, shades the root system, and holds soil moisture better than closely clipped lawns.
- Mulching helps retain moisture in the soil and helps to control weeds that compete with desirable plants for moisture.
- Repair dripping faucets. Regularly check hoses, connectors,

and spigots for leaks.

- Create an awareness of the need for water conservation among children. Avoid purchasing recreational water toys that require a constant stream of water.
- Install a rain barrel to collect rooftop runoff to be used for activities such as lawn and garden watering, car washing, and even window cleaning.

Collecting rainwater from your rooftop during storms by using a rain barrel can not only lower your water bills, but can also decrease water demand during the hot summer months. One inch of rain on a 1,000 square foot roof yields 623 gallons of water. This rooftop runoff provides an ample supply of "soft water" containing no chlorine or other chemicals. It is beneficial to the environment because the stored water would otherwise run off into the storm sewers, bringing pollutants such as oil and grease from the roads and nutrients with it. Once water gets into a storm sewer, it eventually ends up in our streams and rivers. The more rainwater that is reused, the less need there is for chlorinated or chemically treated tap water. Rainwater diversion also decreases the burden on water treatment facilities and municipal drainage systems during storms. The storage of rain water is also recommended for general emergency preparedness or for areas prone to drought.

Ticks and Lyme Desease

Maryland has one of the highest rates of Lyme disease in the United States. Lyme disease, caused by the bite of an infected black-legged tick, was named because the first reported case in the United States was in the town of Old Lyme, Connecticut. Most parts of the United States have reported cases with the most occurring in the Northeast, upper Midwest, and along the Pacific coast. Lyme disease is usually seen during the late spring, summer, and early fall when participation in

outside activities such as gardening, hiking, hunting, and walking is high.

Most people bitten by a tick do not get Lyme disease. The tick must be attached to the skin for at least 24 hours for

for at least 24 hours for transmission to occur. However, everyone who has been bitten by a tick should be closely monitored for at least 30 days for symptoms resembling the flu including chills, fever, headache, lethargy, and muscle pain. There may be a "bulls eye" rash, a flat or slightly raised red spot at the site of the tick bite often with a clear center area.

The risk of a tick bite when walking or hiking in wooded or grassy areas can be reduced by following these tips:

- Wear light-colored long pants, long sleeves, and long socks to help keep ticks off your skin and to more easily locate them if they do crawl onto you.
- Tuck your pant legs into your socks, and tuck your shirt into your pants to help keep ticks on the

outside of clothing.

- Insect repellant containing 20-50% DEET sprayed on all exposed skin and your clothing is recommended for use on adults to prevent tick bites. Repellants with up to 30% DEET can safely be used on children over 2 months of age.
- Treat clothes with permethrin, but do not use permethrin directly on the skin.
- Try to avoid wooded or brushy area with tall grass and leaf litter.
 - Perform daily tick checks after being outdoors, even in your own yard. Inspect all parts of your body including armpits and scalp. Remove ticks immediately using fine-tipped tweezers.
- If a tick is attached to your skin for less than 24 hours, your chance of getting Lyme disease is extremely small. But just to be safe, monitor your health closely after a tick bite and be alert for any signs and symptoms of tick-borne illness.

To safely remove a tick, use fine-tipped tweezers and protect your hands with a tissue or gloves. Grab the tick close to the skin, pulling straight up until all parts of the tick are removed. Do not twist or jerk. Wash the tick bite with soap and warm water or an antiseptic. Wash your hands with soap and water or use an alcoholbased gel. DO NOT use petroleum jelly, a hot match, nail polish, or any other products to remove ticks.

the Council to establish a special taxing district for this purpose.

Infrastructure completed in 2009 or in progress

- Fifth Avenue infrastructure improvements design complete with project commencement scheduled for 2010.
- Construction of Well #6 on Camp Road design complete; project pending need assessment and / or funding
- Expansion of the lift station at the Wastewater Treatment Facility is under design
- North Denton Phase I infrastructure rebuild of Third and High Streets is complete. Phase II for rebuild of Lockerman Street scheduled to begin in spring of 2010.
- Public Works facility garage will be relocated to a new facility purchase of which is pending.

Pending Infrastructure

• Wastewater Treatment Facility ENR upgrade design is 95% complete and under review by MDE. Project scheduled to begin in 2010 and be operational in mid-2011.

The five regular members and one alternate of the Planning Commission are appointed by the Town Council and serve as a citizen review board for Denton planning issues. The Planning Commission holds regularly scheduled meetings the last Tuesday of every month except December, at 6:00 p.m., at the Denton Police Facility, 100 N. Third Street, Denton, Maryland. Special meetings, workshops, and public hearings to discuss keynote issues are held as necessary at an agreed upon time and location.

Two members have completed an Urban Planning Certification through the University of Maryland. Training is strongly recommended for anyone interested in local planning, however, the UMD training program is currently unavailable. Staff is researching alternative training opportunities and once identified will schedule member training for the four new members.

The duties of the Planning Commission include but are not necessarily limited to:

- Review, evaluate, and approve or disapprove plans for subdivisions, and mobile home subdivisions in accordance with the Denton Zoning and Denton Subdivision Codes.
- Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding proposed changes or amendments to the Denton Comprehensive Plan.
 - Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding proposed text amendments to the Zoning Code.

- Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding proposed rezoning.
- Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding proposed changes or amendments to the Subdivision Code
- Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding proposed acquisition and development of lands for Town open space or recreation purposes.
- Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding proposed changes in land use or development arising from local, State, or federal programs or policies.
- Review and make recommendations to the Town Council regarding development site plans required by Article XXIII of the Denton Town Code.

The following represents action taken by the Planning Commission during calendar year, 2009:

Subdivision/Site Plan Approval: The Planning Commission reviewed eight (8) site plans and three (3) major subdivisions. Major subdivisions cannot proceed to final subdivision approval until the water/sewer allocation is reviewed by the Maryland Department of the Environment (coordinated through Caroline County). Two (2) major subdivisions were granted final approval and one (1) major subdivision was granted preliminary subdivision approval. In addition, four (4) concept plans and five (5) Board of Appeals applications were reviewed.

There were seven (7) administrative site plans and three (3) administrative line revisions approved at staff level. Concept plans that age more than four months before returning to the Planning Commission for preliminary review are required to resubmit as concept plans before moving forward. Administrative site plans and line revisions are handled at staff level and reviewed at Planning Commission level at the discretion of the Director of Planning and Codes.

An annexation petition for 25.35 acres was reviewed by the Planning Commission and adopted by the Denton Town Council which became effective December 17, 2009. The entire annexation was zoned Highway Commercial (Map 4). This annexation was consistent with the current adopted Comprehensive Plan.

The first de-annexation petition for 29.293 acres was filed during 2009. No action was taken by the Town Council during 2009.

Meetings: There were eleven (11) regularly scheduled Planning Commission meetings and ten (10) training or working sessions.

The three regular members and one alternate of the Board of Appeals are appointed by the Town Council. They serve as a citizen review board for special exceptions, variances, and appeals cases. The Board of Appeals holds public hearings and open meetings at the call of the Chairperson and at other times, as deemed necessary by the members of the Board. Hearings and meetings are both held in the Town of Denton's Hearing Room at 13 N. Third Street, Denton, Maryland.

The duties of the Board of Appeals include but are not necessarily limited to:

- Conduct public hearings and decide appeals where it is alleged that there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by the Zoning Administrator in the enforcement of the Denton Zoning Ordinance.
- Conduct public hearings and decide special exceptions to the terms of the Denton Zoning Ordinance upon which such Board is specifically authorized to pass under the Denton Zoning Ordinance.
- To authorize upon appeal in specific cases such variance from the specific terms of this Ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interest, where, owing to special conditions, the enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance will result in unwarranted hardship, and injustice, but which will most nearly accomplish the purpose and intent of this Ordinance.
- To determine, in cases of uncertainty, the classifications as to district of any use not specifically named in this Ordinance; provided, however, such use shall be in keeping with uses specifically named in the district regulations.

In 2009, the Board of Appeals scheduled five (5) public hearings. These cases consisted of three (3) requests for variances and two (2) special exception requests.

The five members are appointed to serve by the Town Council. They serve as a citizen review board regarding properties that lie within the Denton Historic District, make recommendations to the Town Council regarding designation or removal of the Historic Overlay Zone, and make recommendations to the Planning Commission regarding land subdivision within the historic Overlay Zone when historic resources are involved. Open meetings are held at least once every three months or by the call of the Chairperson. Typically meetings are held monthly, on the third Wednesday evening, to review applications for permits. All meetings and/or hearings are held at the Denton Town Office, 13 N. Third Street, Denton, Maryland unless otherwise advertised.

Duties of the Historic and Architectural Review Commission include but are not limited to:

- To maintain and update an inventory of historic resources within the Town.
- To review applications for designation of or removal of Historic Overlay Zones, and to forward recommendations to the Mayor and Council who will approve or disapprove the designation of or removal of a Historic Overlay Zone.
- To review and process applications for Historic Area Work Permits.
- To make recommendations to the Planning Commission on courses of action in the event of subdivision of land within a Historic Overlay Zone as it relates to the preservation of

- the historic resource, of the architectural setting, and of the environmental setting in which the resource is located.
- To review any legislation and proposal affecting historic preservation, including preparation of master plans, and to make recommendations on said legislation and proposals to the appropriate authorities.
- To research Town historic resources and recommend applicable sites and structures to the Mayor and Council for designation as Historic Overlay Zone(s).
- To serve as a clearinghouse for information on historic preservation for Town government, individuals, citizens' associations, historical societies, and local advisory committees; to provide information and educational materials for the public; and, to undertake activities to advance the goals of historic preservation in the Town of Denton.
- To regularly inform the Maryland Historical Trust of addition or removal of Town Historic Overlay Zones and of new information or data found or researched regarding historic sites or structures in the town.
- To employ consultants or other temporary personnel, consistent with Town contract provisions, as deemed necessary to assist the Commission in the accomplishment of its functions.

The Historic & Architectural Review Commission held nine (9) regular meetings in 2009. The board reviewed twenty-one (21) applications for various exterior improvements and signage.

Map Amendments (Rezoning Petitions and Critical Area Map Amendments)

A land use change or reclassification initiates a map amendment, as does a change in the critical area boundary or buffer exemption area. A proposal for amendment of the Official Town Zoning Map may be filed by any governmental agency or by a person with a committed financial, contractual, or proprietary interest in the property affected by the proposed amendment. The request is submitted to the Town Council which forwards it to the Planning Commission for an investigation and recommendation. The Planning Commission submits its recommendation to the Town Council within sixty days. After receiving the recommendations of the Planning Commission concerning any map amendment, the Town Council introduces legislation for a proposed change and holds a public hearing. If the proposed amendment is a critical area map amendment, the proposed amendment is sent to the Critical Area Commission for review and approval. Both agencies hold a public hearing, sometimes jointly, regarding the amendment. If approved by the Critical Area Commission, the Town Council can consider approval of the map amendment. Prior to voting on any reclassification of land, a visit to the site in question must be made by a majority of the Town Council to inspect the physical features of the property and to determine the character of the surrounding area. A site visit is not required for sectional or comprehensive reclassification. The Town Council may not approve a reclassification without a finding of facts: That there was a substantial change in the character of the area where the property is located; or that there was a mistake in the existing

With respect to critical area map amendments the Town Council can:











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
Map 1 - Old Zoning




Map 2 - New Zoning (End of 2009)





Attention Settlement Attorneys

Reminder to all settlement attorneys and agencies to please contact the Denton Town Office for fees due to the Town when handling settlements for properties being sold or transferred within the Town limits. There may be water/sewer fees or miscellaneous charges that need to be collected at the time of settlement. This will keep the Town's records up to date and better serve the residents of the Town of Denton. This will also eliminate problems after settlement of any outstanding balances for the new property owner.

Please note: Any property that transfers ownership and the utility fees are not collected at settlement and forwarded to the town that result in the water being turned off for non-payment, the water turn on fee will still be charged. This charged may be passed on to the settlement attorney. Currently the fee to turn water service back on during regular business hours is \$50.00 and after 3:30 p.m., the fee is \$100.00. Health Department Health Corner

Caroline Co. recently received Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene Cancer Report 2009. The report is 310 pages in length and details most types of cancers in Maryland and a breakdown in each county of the number of new cases, cancer deaths, etc.

The data is from 2002-2006. For lung and bronchus cancer new cases in Caroline County from 2002-2006 were 154. There were 130 cancer deaths during 2002-2006. As one can see there is a lot of education, prevention, early detection and treatment that must be done to have fewer cases and deaths from lung and bronchus cancer. There is a direct link from smoking and getting cancer. You can still get lung cancer if you do not smoke if you are around those that smoke! The term for this is secondhand smoke. When people are smoking around you, you are increasing your chances of having lung problems or lung cancer.

We will be starting another quit smoking program the beginning of July here at the Health Department (HAPS) building in Denton. We will offer free Nicotine Patches, Gum/ and or Lozenges to assist those wanting to quit smoking. Usually our clients that quit smoking begin to feel better the day after they quit or within a few days their blood pressure is better, they do not cough as much and within a few weeks can walk stairs or do more things without shortness of breath! If you want more information on our classes, please call 410-479-8080. The classes are FREE! Please think about quitting after reading the statistics above. Also think about each time you smoke around someone else, you are increasing their chances of having lung problems such as lung cancer!

Shore Health System and the Regional Cancer Center in collaboration with the Caroline County Health Department will provide FREE prostate cancer screening services through a grant from the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene Maryland Cancer Fund. The program covers the cost of a PSA blood test, office visit with an urologist to include a digital rectal exam (DRE) and a biopsy if needed. Program eligibility: Men ages 40-70 (some restrictions apply), limited income per federal guidelines, a Maryland resident and no health insurance. For more information to see if you do qualify, please call Leigh Marquess RN at the Wellness Promotions office at 410-479-8080.

Service Fees for Utility Calls

All calls for utility service for properties located in the Town of Denton are assessed the following service fee. This fee applies for all water shut off/turn ons, and other miscellaneous calls for service. Paying utility bills on time can help the property owner avoid these fees.

Special Attention: Any water that is turned off will be assessed this fee to have the water turned back on. Tenants will need to pay this fee before water service is turned back on. (This may not apply for emergency situations pending the nature of the call.)

Ordinance # **601** - An ordinance to appropriate funds and estimate income in accordance with the budget adopted for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2010 and ending June 30, 2011.

Ordinance # **602** - An ordinance of the Town of Denton repealing and reenacting with amendments Chapter 106 of the Town Code regarding storm water management. Introduced 05/03/10, adopted 06/07/10, effective 06/14/10

Ordinance # **603** - An ordinance of the Town of Denton to accept a preservation easement for property located at 808 South Fifth Avenue in the Town of Denton. Introduced 05/03/10, never passed, ordinance withdrawal 06/07/10.

Ordinance #604 – An ordinance of the

Town of Denton amending the Town Code to add Chapter 30 regulating Adult Oriented Businesses within the Town of Denton in order to promote public health, safety and welfare. Introduced 06/07/10, to be considered on 07/12/10.

Ordinance #605 – An ordinance of the Town of Denton amending the Town's Zoning Ordinance to provide definition, permitted locations and supplemental standards for Adult Oriented Businesses. Introduced 06/07/10, to be considered on 07/12/10.
