

Census 2010 Coming to Your Mailbox April 1st

The census is coming, the census is coming! The US Bureau of the Census conducts a count of population and housing every ten years in the years ending in "0". The nation, Maryland, and local municipalities are gearing up for Census 2010 to be conducted on April 1, 2010.

What's the big deal you ask? A successful Census 2010 assures Marylanders of their fair share of political representation ("one person, one vote," and the redrawing of political districts" as well as their fair share of the billions of dollars of federal government funds distributed on the basis of population counts. This is one of the many reasons that it is so important to complete the year 2010 Census information sheets. If only half of Denton's residents complete the Census, the amount of funding the Town receives is only half of the accurate amount. And that means that the Town Council has to provide services to all residents with only half of the money they should

be working with. In addition, an accurate census is vital for making decisions on where to provide community investments such as roads, schools, and healthcare. Businesses also rely on census data describing communities for site location, marketing, and service delivery decisions.

A public awareness campaign has begun to inform Marylanders of the importance of an accurate population count through private/ public partnerships. By bringing together those representing business, labor, ethnic, minority and immigrant populations as well as religious organizations and nonprofits, every effort is being made to reach those missed in previous counts, and allay fears about the census. Participation in the census is in your own self interest. If you don't fill out your census, decision makers won't be able to determine what the needs of your community are. Every household will receive a census form printed in English,

The Homestead Credit applies only to the principal residence of the property owner and is based

on the total market value for the dwelling and land associated with the dwelling.

Technically, the Homestead Credit does not limit the market value of the property as determined by the Department of Assessments and Taxation. It is actually a credit calculated on any assessment increase exceeding 10% (or the lower cap enacted by the local governments) from one year to the next. The credit is calculated based

2010 Legal Notice Mandatory Semiannual Payment Real Estate Property Taxes

REAL PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS OPTIONS

1. Pay Real Property taxes in full by Sept. 30, 2010 with no penalty or interest.

2. OWNER-OCCUPIED RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY TAXES May pay taxes semi-annually using the coupons on the tax bill.

The first payment is due Sept. 30, 2010 and the second payment is due by December 31, 2010 The second payment may have a service charge as shown on the tax bill.

3. PAYMENT FROM ESCROW ACCOUNTS FOR OWNER-OCCUPIED RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY If an escrow account is established for the payment of the property tax, the escrow account servicer (mortgage company) shall pay taxes in semiannual installments unless the escrow account servicer has received written direction from the property owner or borrower to pay property tax in annual payments. This became mandated by the State of Maryland effective July 1, 2000.

If a taxpayer provides written directions to an escrow account servicer at least 60 days prior to the beginning of the tax year (By May 1 of each year) property taxes shall be paid on an annual basis on behalf of the taxpayer. Denton Town Office


Being mayor is a big job and city and town governments often rely on community volunteers to help provide services and improve the lives of their citizens.

Rental License and Inspections

Rental License and Inspections

In the Summer of 2009, the Town of Denton adopted a zoning ordinance requiring all rental property owners to register their properties for a rental license and provide for rental inspections. Inspections are performed by the Town using the International Property Maintenance Code, 2006 edition.

The Town is divided into four rental districts that correspond to the Zoning District classification, and each district, in general, will be

inspected according to the following schedule:

- Central Commercial (CC) District: 1st Year
- Mixed Residential (MR) District: 2nd Year
- Town Scale Residential (TR) District: 3rd Year

- General Commercial (GC), Commercial Medical
- (CM): 4th Year andSuburban Residential
- (SR): The Property Maintenance

Rebuilding Together Caroline Co.

The mission of our Rebuilding Together affiliate is to provide a free service to low-income Caroline County homeowners who are elderly, disabled or families with children and are facing necessary but unaffordable home repairs.

In support of this mission, we maintain an architectural salvage depot to facilitate the recycling of usable construction materials, making them available at low cost to homeowners, thereby reducing waste and promoting environmental sustainability.

Some Statistics

Nationally, the number of lowincome homeowners increases each year. The current 24 million low-income homeowner families is expected to grow to an astonishing 28.5 million by the year 2010. More and more families are placed in the position of choosing between vital necessities such as food or medicine and a roof that does not leak. Often disabled and/or elderly homeowners cannot afford the modifications that allow them to age in place and remain in their own homes. Rebuilding Together works to ensure that as many of those families as possible do not have to make these difficult choices.

Locally, a 2003 survey counted 3,266 Caroline County residents living at or below the poverty level. A 2004 count found 249 substandard dwellings in the county, 72% of them owner-occupied. Caroline consistently ranks as one of the poorest of Maryland's twenty-three counties.

Free Home Repairs

Our free home repair services are available in Caroline County, Maryland, to low-income elderly or disabled individuals or families with children who own and live in homes requiring necessary but unaffordable repairs or improvements.

Affiliate volunteers assist each client in determining that financial need requirements are met and in determining the structural needs of the dwelling.

If, in the screening process, it

is determined that the applicants financial situation does not qualify for the free Rebuilding Together service, the applicant will be referred to other agencies, government and private, where financial assistance to accomplish the necessary work may be available.

Architectural Salvage

The Mid-Shore Salvage Depot, a self-sustaining salvage operation, diverts useable building materials from landfills, makes them available at low cost to the public and helps the Mid-Shore become more environmentally friendly. Boat Ramp Permit Reminder

Boating season is just around the corner. Just a reminder, effective April 1, 2009, a permit is required to launch any vessel, via boat trailer, at all Caroline County boat ramps and public landings.

Permits may be purchased for one day use or annual use and vary in price.

A one day pass for Maryland residents is \$5 and \$10 for out of state residents. Annual pass fees are \$20 for Maryland residents and \$50 for out of state residents. Annual permits are valid only when displayed on the driver's side of the boat trailer tongue, within 12 inches of the hitch. Daily permits must be hung on the inside mirror facing the windshield. Fines for a first offense

are \$50, and a second offense is \$100.

on the 10% limit for purposes of the State property tax, and 10% or less (as determined by local governments) for purposes of local taxation. In other words, the homeowner pays no property tax on the market value increase which is above the limit.

The tax credit will be granted if the following conditions are met during the previous tax year:

• The property was not transferred to new ownership.

· There was no change in the zoning classification requested by the homeowner resulting in an increase value of the property.

· A substantial change did not occur in the use of the property.

· The previous assessment was not clearly erroneous.

A further condition is that the dwelling must be the owner's principal residence and the owner must have lived in it for at least six months of the year, including July 1 of the year for which the credit is applicable, unless the owner was temporarily unable to do so by reason of illness or need of special care. An owner can receive a credit only on one property - their principal residence.

If you are a property owner and the property is your principal residence be sure to check your assessment notice to verify that the information states "principal residence - yes". A "yes" indicates that the property is your principal residence; a "no" indicates that it is not and credits will not be given. THIS INFORMATION AFFECTS ELIGIBILITY FOR THE HOMESTEAD TAX CREDIT. If a correction is required or you have any questions, you should complete and submit the form found in your assessment notice or contact the Maryland State Dept. of Assessments local office at 410-819-4450.

In November 2006 the Denton Town Council lowered the tax credit percentage for in town owner occupied properties to 5% with the adoption of resolution #689. FOR THE UPCOMING JULY 1, 2010 TAX BILLING SEASON THE TOWN WILL MAINTAIN THE 5% CAP.

Properties are reassessed once every three years and property owners are notified of any change in their assessment. Assessments are certified by the State Department of Assessments to local governments where they are converted into property tax bills by applying the appropriate property tax rates. The Town of Denton is located in assessment area two and properties within the Denton town limits are scheduled to be re-assessed around January 1, 2011.

Once the assessments are reevaluated the reduction will have a greater benefit to those property owners that qualify for this credit.

All of the Town of Denton real estate property taxes are billed and collected through the Caroline County Treasurer's office based on the assessments received from the State of Marvland. Property owners receive one bill that combines State, County and Town real estate taxes together.

Spring Loose Leaf Collection

The Town of Denton will for leaf removal: be providing a special spring loose leaf collection service to vacuum up leaves that are left over from the fall. The Denton Public Works Department is scheduling their loose leaf removal service to occur on Friday April 16, Monday April 19, Friday April 23, and Monday April 26, 2010. Leaves must be bagged for pickup the remaining

months of the year.

L e a f vacuuming will on Friday occur and/or Monday pending work load. It will be necessary to call in your loose leaf vacuum pickup request by 12 NOON

on Thursday to guarantee pickup by Monday.

Bagged leaf collection will still take place on Wednesdays and must be called in to the town office by 12 NOON on Tuesdays.

Citizens are encouraged to call the Town Office at 410-479-2050 to request pickup. If calling after hours please leave the requests on the Town Office answering machine, ext. 25.

Please follow these guidelines

· Rake leaves to the curbside or alley

· DO NOT rake leaves into the street

· DO NOT rake leaves onto the sidewalk

· Make sure all sticks and limbs are removed from the pile of leaves



there are no other objects or debris mixed with the leaves (like bottles, cans, flowerpots, gloves, ashes, pet waste or other trash)

leaves with sticks,

limbs or other debris will not be picked up

All pickups will be done by request/appointment only.

Loose leaf pickups will occur from April 16 through April 26, on Mondays and Fridays only. Leaves must be bagged any other time.

Water Bills to be mailed April 1, 2010 PAY WATER BILLS ON TIME TO AVOID SERVICE **DISCONNECTION & EXTRA FEES**

Utility Bills will be mailed around April 1, 2010 and are due to be paid by April 25, 2010. Interest at the rate of 1% is added on April 25, 2010.

Past due notices (red cards) will be mailed on April 27, 2010 for any account that has an overdue balance, this is the FINAL REMINDER prior to having the water service shut off.

Payments can be made during regular office hours, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., or after hours by placing the payment in an envelope in the night deposit box located to the right of the front door on outside the Town Office building.

Water that is turned off for non-payment will be assessed a service charge in order to have the water turned back on. The water turn-on service charge is \$50.00 if turned back on before 3:30 p.m. and \$100.00 for after hours, this fee is subject to change.

It is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that payments are made in a timely manner.

Landlords and property managers who have arrangements for the tenants to pay the bills, please be sure to forward the bills to the tenants immediately upon receiving them to ensure prompt payment and to avoid shut off issues. In the past several tenants have stated that they do not receive the bill until the day it is due or when late notices have been sent.

Failure to receive the bill does not relieve the responsibility of the payment that is due. If a citizen is unable to make their payment by the due date, please contact the Finance Department at 410-479-2050 prior to April 25, 2010. Water service will be shut off for non-payment.

If your census questionnaire is not mailed back, a local census taker will stop by your home and collect the information.

What is a Census Taker? Open the door to a census taker and open doors for your community.

counted By being you are standing up for what your community's needs are. That's why census takers are so important. A census taker is a person from your community who is hired by the Census Bureau to make sure that your neighborhood gets represented as accurately as possible. The census takers primary responsibility is to collect census information from residences that have not sent back their 2010 Census form.

• The Census Bureau provides the census taker with a binder containing all of the addresses that didn't send back a filled out census form

• The census taker then visits all of those addresses and records the answers to the questions on the form

• If no one answers at a particular residence, a census taker will visit that home up to three times, each time leaving a door

hanger featuring a phone number; residents can call the number on the hanger to schedule the visit

The census taker will ONLY ask the questions that appear on the census form.

Do I have to talk to the census taker?

Yes. Your participation in the 2010 Census is vital and required by law, (Section 221, of Title 13 of the U.S. Code). However, rather than rely on criminal charges, the Census Bureau is very successful in getting participation by explaining the importance of the questions we ask and how the information benefits our communities.

Your privacy and confidentiality is our priority:

The census taker who collects your information is sworn for life to protect your data under Federal Law Title 13. Those who violate the oath face criminal penalties: Under federal law, the penalty for unlawful disclosure is a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment for up to 5 years, or both.



Restitution Fund Program for paying for colonoscopies. However, for fiscal year 2010 starting July 1, funds for the **Cigarette Restitution** Fund were cut

for every county in Maryland. Unfortunately, the local Health Department used to be able to pay for 50 colonoscopies each year for those women and men age 50 and above who had no insurance. This year, we only have funds to pay for 14 colonoscopies and cannot enroll any more clients this year. We hope to have some funds restored in the next fiscal year.

Even though the Health Department is not able to enroll any clients this year, our work focuses on encouraging those with insurance who are 50 years and older, who have a strong family history of colorectal cancer, or who are due again for a follow-up colonoscopy to get it done. The best way for our gastroenterologists to try and prevent most colorectal cancers is to view one's colon and



turn into cancer. Please note that all polyps do not turn into cancer, but the gastroenterologist is the best

person to determine what polyps may be a problem so therefore when they say to come back for a follow-up please do. The one way that all of us can lower the colorectal cancer

death rate in our county and for our family and friends is to follow the screening guidelines and what our doctor recommends.

If your church, organization, business or other group would like someone to speak about colorectal cancer screening, the Health Department would be glad to come. Please call us at 410-479-8080. In addition, if you have a newsletter that you would like information on colorectal cancer to be included, we would like to help. The more people that we can reach the less suffering that will occur from having colorectal cancer. The Health Department wants to thank the following gastroenterologists and their staff for working with our program: Digestive Health Associates, Dr. Charles DiNapoli, and Dr. Michael Moran.

Barb and Doug Mutolo, who also run the Greensborough Trading Company, purchased the building in 2009 and have since been restoring it to its original beauty. The Riverside Country Inn will take its place once again as a landmark of Caroline County.

Attention Settlement Attorneys

Reminder to all settlement attorneys and agencies to please contact the Denton Town Office for fees due to the Town when handling settlements for properties being sold or transferred within the Town limits. There may be water/sewer fees or miscellaneous charges that need to be collected at the time of settlement. This will keep the Town's records up to date and better serve the residents of the Town of Denton. This will also eliminate problems after settlement of any outstanding balances for the new property owner.

Please note: Any property that transfers ownership and the utility fees are not collected at settlement and forwarded to the town that result in the water being turned off for non-payment, the water turn on fee will still be charged. This charged may be passed on to the settlement attorney. Currently the fee to turn water service back on during regular business hours is \$50.00 and after 3:30 p.m., the fee is \$100.00. Forms are available to use when requesting information. Any questions, please call the Town of Denton at (410) 479-2050.

Service Fees for Utility Calls

All calls for utility service for properties located in the Town of Denton are assessed the following service fee. This fee applies for all water shut off/turn ons, and other miscellaneous calls for service. Paying utility bills on time can help the property owner avoid these fees.

Special Attention: Any water that is turned off will be assessed this fee to have the water turned back on. Tenants will need to pay this fee before water service is turned back on. (This may not apply for emergency situations pending the nature of the call.)
